**MORE THAN** 5000 dog registration invoices will be sent out to Invercargill dog owners in early July and the Council's Animal Services team is reminding people that reminder notices will no longer be issued after payments are due. Animal Services Team Leader

Kerry Kawe said people have until August 1 to register their dog, after which a 25% late penalty will be applied.

"If you are sent a dog registration fee please ensure you pay on time to avoid a penalty fee.

Mr Kawe also asked people to

notify the Animal Services team if their dog had been desexed to receive a discount on their dog

## Three-yearly revaluations of Invercargill city properties to start

THE three-yearly valuation reviews of Invercargill properties are to start soon.

Council has contracted Quotable Value Ltd (QV) to do the job which must be legally undertaken every three years. Valuers are expected to finish in early October; the previous valuation was completed in 2014. The valuation work covers about 25,700 properties, including 20,800 residential properties within the Invercargill City Boundary.

The effective date of the revaluation is July 1, 2017, and the new property value information will be used by the Council to set rates from the 2018/2019 financial year. Notices will be sent to property owners with their new property values from October 18, 2017.

Ratepayers have a right to object to these valuations provide the objections are received by November 24, 2017. QV will also handle objections from

ratepayers in respect of their valuations.

The rating value is established by considering relevant property sales from each area around the time of valuations. A market trend is established and then applied to properties.

Further information from QV plans on each property and other sources, including Council records, are used. Valuers then inspect a sample of properties (which may include recently sold properties) and those where building consents show work has been completed recently.

Valuers will be carrying identification at all times during inspec-

Before release, the assessed values are audited by the Office of the Valuer-General and will be released to the public following approval. For people whose properties have gone up in value, it may not mean a rates increase directly as it is only one of several methods used to apportion rates.
