The positive feedback we have been receiving is great and the vision we have for the project is now becoming clear as the areas work towards completion. We are looking in detail at what happens when we start on the pocket park outside the Cambridge Place Arcade and how we need to manage

We have also been working with PowerNet to coordinate changes to their cables and we are positioning their new power boxes in suitable areas at the same time.

We look forward to completing the project and creating a great area for people visiting and working in the Inner City to enjoy.

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Stage 1, which includes the planting of the first area, is to be completed by April 3. Stage 2 will see the middle area completed by April 10. Stage 3A (the pocket park northside), will begin after Easter and includes excavation and reshaping of the road and laying the foundations for stone walls, shelters and surface paving.

The Stage 3A work will require having a traffic lane narrowed and moved slightly south. Access to underground car parking and potential truck access to the street will be discussed with businesses when planning for the work is being carried out in the next few weeks. Stage 3B (the pocket park southside), will see everything finished for the pocket park including all stone walls, paving, decking, structures and plantings, with a goal end date of late May.

We are pleased with how the public and Contractor have been working safely together. We have been able to work through those few complaints we have had and Fulton Hogan and their sub-contractors have chosen to work some evenings to get areas

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underway where this would have caused access and traffic issues.

Improvements are nearing completion and planting of the first area is planned to be finished by April 3.



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

A map identifying where the activity is happening has been created for distribution to the public. It also includes the treasure hunt for young people.



Council examines Earthquake-prone Buildings Survey results

Council has received the results from the Earthquake-prone buildings survey undertaken last year, and Council's Director of Environmental and Planning Services Pamela Gare says they provide a valuable snap shot of what the community thinks.

"A large majority of respondents were residential ratepayers which was part of the wider community response. That was the idea of the survey – to provide us with a snap shot."

"The survey was delivered to all CBD ratepayers, and then subsequently opened to the public. The online survey received 74 responses and the results highlighted two distinct camps of respondents for most questions - either a relatively even split or a strong majority decision," Mrs Gare said.

Approximately 60% of respondents were in favour of making low interest loans available for the strengthening of heritage buildings. Almost 75% of respondents felt the Council should provide a waiver of Council fees (e.g. building consent fees) for earthquake strengthening and 60% of respondents felt the maximum amount the Council should provide as a low interest loan should be \$75,000 (rather than \$25,000 or \$50,000).

Many of the questions received evenly split responses such as; "Should Council provide a grant towards earthquake strengthening?" Following this question, respondents were equally split between choosing one of three total amounts people should receive in grants for their building.

Slightly less than half of the respondents were in favour of seeing grants being available only for strengthening of heritage buildings, while more people were in favour of seeing Council providing low interest loans towards earthquake strengthening of all buildings.

The research questions and proposed options were based on a system that Dunedin City Council had implemented to assist local businesses with earthquake-prone buildings, Mrs Gare said. "The Dunedin City Council designed a series of packages and we are looking to see if any of these would be relevant to Invercargill."

"Not all old buildings are earthquake prone, and some have been strengthened. Some businesses, such as local banks, have been proactive in their buildings being strengthened to meet the requirements. An example of a strong ageing building is the First Church which recently received an 80% pass of the National Building Standard.

"The feedback gave an indication of what locals would like to see when it came to help dealing with earthquake prone buildings in Invercargill, though they would need to wait for the Government to release its decision on changing the Building Act. When legislation changes, we will do specific consultation with CBD owners and occupiers," Mrs Gare said.

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
