Our timetable for this work was always very tight with little margin for any unexpected delays. When tenders closed the contractors advised they were unable to complete the work before Christmas. To avoid disruption to Esk Street at the busiest time of the year it was agreed to delay the start until January 2015.

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Council urges property owners to update their BWOF



Council is reminding commercial property owners to ensure their Building Warrant of Fitness (BWOF) is up to date for buildings with specified systems (e.g. fire alarms, emergency lighting, backflow prevention devices etc) installed.

A Building Warrant of Fitness (Form 12) is a statement from the building owner confirming that the systems in the building have been checked and the inspection and maintenance required for the building (stated in the Compliance Schedule) has complied for the previous 12 months. The building owner is responsible for ensuring the requirements of the Compliance Schedule are met. The owner is required to use an Independently Qualified Person (IQP) to check the systems. The owner pays for an Independently Qualified Person to inspect and maintain the building's specified systems.

Feedback wanted on Christmas lights

A decision is to be made by Council on the future replacement of Invercargill's ageing Christmas lights, following their crucial maintenance this year which will see the current lights used for another two years.

The Council owns the Christmas lights and Electricity Invercargill Limited arranges for them to be put up and taken down.

Cr Boniface said the ageing lights that had been installed over the last 25 plus years, usually lasted about seven years and were gradually replaced over time, but the English supplier of the Christmas lights had now gone out of business. Council would need to look at alternative suppliers for replacements.

"With the inner city redevelopment, this is a good time to

discuss options for replacement lights, what they should look like, where they should be sourced and where they should be hung.

"The Christmas lights were also originally hung in Esk, Kelvin and Don Streets but since the last inner city upgrade they were hung only in Dee and Tay Streets. With the new redevelopment, people might like to consider whether they should be moved back to Esk and Don Streets.

"There is also the option of looking at the possibility of winter lights.

"Council will be looking into this from 2015 onwards and consulting with the Inner City Working Group and other key stakeholders," Cr Boniface said.

Council gives the green light to Esk Street upgrade

The Invercargill City Council has given the green light to a \$1.4 million makeover of Esk Street, adding in \$267,000 of extra amenities after public consultation.

Chair of the Inner City Working Group Cr Graham Sycamore presented the proposal to Council, along with the Inner City Working Group's recommendation that the budget be increased to include the extra amenities requested by public submissions.

Council's Roading Manager Russell Pearson said the original cost estimate of \$825,000 was set in 2012 and was based on the design concept at the time. "Following continued consultation with the public, people's expectations changed. After adding in the extras requested by the public and tendering the project, the cost rose to \$1.4 million.

"This is the first of the 12 precincts to be tendered. The

Inner City Working Group's resolution was to prioritise the spending on the Esk Street Hub from the pocket park to Dee Street and reduce expenditure in future precinct developments. The Committee agreed that there were significant savings to be made in future stages to compensate for the additional costs in this first stage.

"The Committee considered whether they should identify savings for this stage and remove certain elements to cut back costs, or recommend to Council to spend the full amount. As Esk Street is the key foundation element of the CBD, the Committee felt it was the best investment to make," Mr Pearson said.

Council accepted the Committee's recommendation and approved the full proposal.

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Work is scheduled to start mid-January and take approximately four months to complete.
