## ART STARTS TO FILL THE CBD GAPS

HWR Property Limited and Space for Artists (SFA) have been brought together to deliver the first project connecting landlords of empty buildings in Invercargill with artists, community projects and collectors who need an inner city location for their enterprise.

The first project to be brokered by SFA opened this week with Invercargill-born landscape artist Caley J. Hall. His studio and gallery are now based at 49 Tay Street, Invercargill.

Property Manager for HWR Property, Sue Hill said the company was thrilled to be able to support the arts in Invercargill and hoped to see other landlords follow suit. "We have so much artistic talent here in Invercargill and it's great to support them in their success."

Caley was born in Invercargill and works primarily in oil. He is well known for his

landscapes and expressionist abstracts
Recently relocating back to Invercargill, Caley
has stuck to painting realistic Fiordland
paintings for the past three years. He said
he has never stopped loving Southland and
Fiordland so it makes sense to come home
and paint here. He is excited to be given
the opportunity to paint pictures in public.

"It's pretty impossible for an artist to open a gallery at city rents, so any schemes that encourage the arts are extremely important in



Invercargill," Caley said.

City Centre Kari Graber said "It has taken almost a year to get the first landlord to agree to trial this new project. "I am really hopeful that others will follow suit. This is a great way to add vibrancy to the City Centre, by filling vacant spaces and providing support to both the arts and the tourist economy. It's the support of private business owners like Scott and Joc O'Donnell who's vision and passion for vibrancy in Invercargill that has allowed this to happen."

Viviane Vagt, founder of Space for Artists, started the organisation in July last year to facilitate and encourage the use of vacant buildings for short-term use by local community groups and individuals. It is based on a broker model already used successfully in cities overseas.

The Space for Artists initiative connects the individual artists with building owners who have vacant space. A formal temporary agreement platform protects both parties but also allows flexibility for either party to explore other options, for example to test the local market, or to sign a permanent lease.
