

Join the conversation on new ideas website

THE new site, called *Imagine Invercargill*, is a place where anyone can add, discuss, and vote on ideas to add vibrancy to the city.

Every three years, Council develops a Long-Term Plan that is a ten-year forecast for the city and projects, and a thirty-year forecast for infrastructure.

It is the vision that the Council looks towards for 2018 - 2028 so it can prepare for what is to come.

The Council is looking to enhance the city and preserve its character while embracing innovation and change.

Council Policy Analyst Anna Goble said *Imagine Invercargill* was another tool for consulting with ratepayers as part of the Long-Term Plan process.

“Council uses various ways to consult with ratepayers, one of which is the Consultation Caravan, another is offering online surveys, which have been very popular via social media. *Imagine Invercargill* is another mechanism for consultation.”

Ms Goble said *Imagine Invercargill* was all

about engaging with the community.

“You can upload an idea, any photos or documents to go with it, then others can comment or vote on your idea.”

Two topics have already been uploaded to *Imagine Invercargill* to help get people started; one on welcome signs for the city, and another on whether the central business district should be Smokefree.

While the ideas posted on the site will not necessarily be included in the Plan, it gives Council a fresh perspective and some ideas may be considered further.

Ms Goble said that people can also post to the site anonymously, which may be of benefit to some who might not otherwise come forward with their ideas.

Should the website prove a popular tool for consultation during the Long-Term Plan process, Ms Goble said it could be used for further consultation in future, for projects and reports such as the Annual Plan.

Animals a labour of love

FOR Animal Services Acting Team Leader Elle Dickson, working with dogs is a labour of love.

In fact, Ms Dickson loves working with all animals – although she admits chickens do freak her out a little bit.

“Usually if we get called out to a chicken I cross my fingers that someone else can go,” she said with a laugh.

Dickson said she and the three other Animal Control officers share the same passion for animals, and they can be dealing with animals of all shapes and sizes on call-outs.

“Pigs, sheep, cows, chickens, horses, pretty much anything that wanders out on the roads. We don’t really chase after ducks though, they tend to fly away,” she said.

It’s not all chasing after lost or wandering animals though.

The Animal Services team also works hard to help educate others, particularly about dogs and keeping safe.

“We do school visits and teach the kids how to approach dogs safely, we provide training for some businesses and their staff, for example meter readers, if they’re a bit unsure about how to handle dogs in their situation,” Ms Dickson said.

Animal Services also provides support and advice to the public, so if you are worried about your own dog’s behaviour, or the behaviour of a dog in your area, people are encouraged to call the Council and ask for help, Ms Dickson said.

A big part of the job, and an important one, is the work Animal Services staff undertake to reunite lost or wandering animals with their owners.

And, if the owner cannot be found, sometimes those animals can be rehomed.

In Ms Dickson’s case, she has personally adopted two animals from the pound; a Kunekune pig named Ginge, and an eight-year-old dog named Buster.

“We knew Buster’s owners and we knew their history, and they agreed for me to take him on,” she said.

Reminder: The final date to pay registration without penalty is July 31. Dog owners can register their dog and pay at icc.govt.nz or in person at the Civic Administration Building, 101 Esk Street. Owners will then be supplied with the red registration tag for the 2017/2018 year. If owners fail to register their pets by 31 July, they will incur a 25 per cent penalty fee.



Fire Prevention (Vegetation) Bylaw Review 2017

THE Invercargill City Council is in the process of reviewing bylaws that were enacted in 2010. Council has bylaws that are required under the Local Government Act 2002 and these must be reviewed regularly.

The Fire Prevention (Vegetation) Bylaw addresses the need to prevent fires from spreading and control any nuisance that may arise from smoke or ash within the City.

The Government is restructuring the existing fire service, and as such, Council’s role in the future in relation to fire prevention and control will be limited. This bylaw may not be required once this restructure, which is expected to occur over the 2017-2018 years, has been completed. Council proposes to extend this current bylaw with no changes required, and then review this again once the Fire Service has been restructured to either amend or revoke the bylaw.

THERE are just a few days remaining in the Invercargill Public Library's Winter Reading Challenge.

"This year we are hoping to receive 200 entries back, which would be 1200 books read. We usu-


ally receive a number of entries on the final day," Ms Findlater said.
