## Baby birds bounce back in Bluff

There is hope for an at-risk native bird which hadn't been seen on Bluff Hill for more than 100 years thanks to the efforts of the Bluff Hill Motupõhue Environment Trust.

**THE** Trust reintroduced 43 South Island robins to the hill in between March and August 2017, and their hard work has paid off with seven chicks, from three sets of parents, having been sighted so

Trust chairperson Estelle Leask said the successful breeding of the birds was an awesome reward after extensive pest control programme undertaken by volunteers during the past 10 years.

Mrs Leask said stoats, rats, and other predators had been an everpresent issue in the 204 hectares of Department of Conservation reserve the Trust cares for.

The Trust also works along six kilometres of coastline in the Bluff Harbour/Awarua Bay area

At present, 25 volunteers work to clear 23 trapping lines as frequently as possible, which, during summer, is often at least once

The Trust receives support from their partners Invercargill City Council, Blacks Fasteners, Southern Generation Limited and Awarua Runanga also numerous other sponsors, with logistical support from the Department of Conservation and Environment Southland, to undertake the work.

Mrs Leask said the Trust had permits to bring in a further 17 robins, which they hoped to do in March this year.

The next challenge for the Trust would be to come up with a pest management plan for feral cats in

"We had applied to be able to reintroduce tieke – South Island saddlebacks – to the area, but we were declined because of our lack of appropriate feral cat management plan. It's a really challenging one because feral cats are the cause of so much biodiversity loss in this country, and throughout the world," Mrs Leask said.

The Trust was named the winner of the Southland Community Environment Award for Environmental Action in the Community in 2017.

Invercargill City Council is also working in the Bluff Hill area to remove wilding pines and gorse, and planting more native

### Panel calls for public feedback on dogs

Independent Community Advisory Panel in Invercargill is asking for the community's feedback on dog rehoming and euthanasia in the area.

Following the public response to a video showing a dog being euthanised by captive bolt in 2017, the Invercargill City Council suspended use of the euthanasia method immediately and called for an Independent Community Advisory Panel of six people to investigate options and report back to Council.

The Panel has spent the past several months meeting with various charities, organisations, and dog experts, and is now seeking the public's views through the Invercargill Dog Rehoming and Euthanasia Survey, as well as several "drop in" sessions.

This survey is designed to gain feedback from the public on their preferences on both of these is-

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#### Signs coming soon to CBD **THE** new smokefree areas policy will mean Invercargill residents can finally take a breath of fresh

air in the city. The Smokefree Areas Policy was unanimously passed at the Invercargill City Council meeting on 7 November 2017. The policy makes the area within the boundary of Tay, Spey Street,

The policy idea was originally submitted by the Invercargill Youth Council and has been actively encouraged by Smokefree

Deveron and Dee streets (includ-

ing Wachner Place) a smokefree

A Smokefree Murihiku spokeswoman said the policy directly supports the New Zealand government's goal of a smokefree 2025. Smokefree 2025 isn't a ban on smoking, but sets the target of having fewer than 5% of New Zealanders identifying as

"Removing smoking from the public eye is one of the best tools for helping prevent the next generation from starting - which is something even people who already smoke have said they want," the spokeswoman said.

A working group, including representatives from Well South, Sport Southland, Healthy Families, Public Health South, Cancer Society, and the Invercargill City Council are working to come up with a plan for signs to go up in the CBD to let people know the area is now smokefree.
