CBD RETAIL STRATEGY GETS UNDER WAY

Invercargill's City Centre moves into high gear next week as the first phase of the Retail Strategy begins taking shape.

A unique City Centre brand and improved online presence were identified in the Strategy as pivotal to building attraction, connection and performance. Council and stakeholders agreed, with the development of these initiatives as priorities.

In the next month team members from First Retail Group, brand expert Tim Christie, and community e-commerce specialists, Storbie, will be meeting with businesses and other stakeholders to further develop ideas that began through earlier consultations.

"Workshops during the Strategy project uncovered excellent initial branding ideas and messages we are keen to develop from," says First Retail Group's Chris Wilkinson. "The region's goal of welcoming 10,000 more residents sits firmly in focus as we collectively look at themes that will best engage both today's and tomorrow's audiences."

The use of an AED can, in some cases, increase the chance of survival after someone suffers a cardiac arrest. They need to be used as quickly as possible and knowing the location of these devices ahead of an incident can remove the panic factor when
