**YOUTH COUNCIL 2016**

The Annual Report was drafted by Ollie Mortenson, Community Development Officer responsible for the Youth Council following direction of members. The members then critiqued the report and provided comments for inclusion. The report provides an excellent overview of the breadth of involvement and the achievements of the 2016 Youth Council.

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## 2016 Invercargill City Youth Council Report

The 2016 Invercargill City Youth Council (ICYC) has had a successful year. An unprecedented number of applications for the 2016 ICYC were received. In total thirty-three applications were received and accepted. Due to the large numbers accepted the 2016 ICYC trialed a new model of Youth Council structure. This saw two Youth Councils operate. The two Youth Councils were made from student's year 11 and under and student's year 12 and over. The two Youth Councils were named respectively the Unders' and the Overs' for short.

The Overs' Youth Council had 19 members and the Unders' had 14 members. The Overs' Youth Council lost two members over the year who pursued employment opportunities. Each Youth Council had a mixture of gender, age, and experience. They would meet separately and discuss issues before coming together to report on the key findings and to discuss some topics as one group. Though the trial has definitely provided the opportunity for some of the younger ICYC members to find a civic voice it has not been without challenges. Often the two Youth Councils would come to different opinions about the same matter. This created an environment for healthy debate over the year and resulted in two submissions being prepared on several topics. It also demonstrates that we should never assume one voice speaks for all youth.

Committees were open to members from both Youth Councils and were seen as a good way for peer leadership opportunities, with the older and more experienced members imparting their knowledge and experience to the younger members. The 2016 Youth Council has had a few members involved for approaching four years and their experience, drive and passion for youth civic participation has inspired the younger members to wish to return to the youth council. This has become a real strength of the ICYC and can be seen through the continuation of projects and ideas over a couple of years. For example, Smoke Free Committee and the Brighter Invers Committee.

Another great achievement of the 2016 ICYC has been the rise in public profile. This has provided some answers to questions like, 'What does the Youth Council actually do?' This has seen the ICYC make headlines for the following topics; Smoke free Esk Street, New Entrance signs and the Candidates forum. Though this has at times been somewhat divisive, it has created conversation and civic participation. If civic participation is something that the Youth Council can offer then this can only be seen as a positive attribute in a time of declining civic participation. The youth have an opinion and wish for it to be heard.

The following is a description of some of the projects, achievements and activities that the 2016 ICYC have been involved in this year.

### **Smoke Free Esk Street**

The Smokefree Esk Street Committee has been a long standing project of the ICYC. The committee was originally formed 2 years ago and each year new members have joined and carried on the work from previous years. 2016 saw the culmination of all of 2015's activities, including the delivery to Council of the survey results conducted on Esk Street in 2015. This survey found that there was real public interest in making Esk Street smoke free. The outcome was that staff would draft a Smoke Free Public Places Policy for presentation to the Council in early 2017.

## **Southland Cancer Society - Smokefree Cars**

The Southland Cancer Society asked the Youth Council to assist in organising an event to promote smoke free motoring. This saw the ICYC members hold events at James Hargest College, Verdon College and Aurora College. ICYC members tried to get as many students as they could into a smoke free car provided by GWD Toyota. Aurora College took the title with 34 students getting into the car, followed by Verdon with 26 students, and then James Hargest with 19 students. The ICYC were nominated for a Southland Trust Power award for their participation in this event.

## **Youth Parliamentarians**

Danielle and Stephen ran a youth focused workshop as part of Youth Week to help canvas attitudes and opinions from local youth in preparation for the trip to Wellington.

The committee created a project plan that identified how this project could move forward. This was presented to Council in July where the Council voted to continue with this project. This will be project will be progressed by the 2017 Committee for a Brighter Invers.

The forum had members from every South Island Youth Council. The morning session saw every youth council present what they did and projects they were involved in. The afternoon session had participants attend two workshops, one about how to use media effectively and the second on how to use social media effectively. Overall it was a very useful forum and members came away with some useful information and good ideas of possible future projects.

## **UN Youth Declaration Auckland**

Two Youth Council members, Aidan Murdoch and Elisapeta Kuresa attended the UN Youth Declaration in Auckland in April. Both found this was an invaluable experience and really enjoyed the opportunity to attend. The youth declaration is an annual event and results in a document which is presented to parliament providing youth views on key public policy.

“I was selected as one of only two youth councillors to attend the UN Youth Declaration of 2016 representing Invercargill. Youth Declaration gathered high school students from throughout the nation to collaborate in the creation of a declaration to be presented before parliament which indicates the political stance of New Zealand's youth. Along the way students are able to partake in politically educational seminars and activities which serve to enliven the cooperative, and leadership attributes participants and ranged from interviews with veteran MPs and experts in the field, to team bonding exercises. Attendees are separated into one of many different focus groups varying across a multitude of areas of government, mine being the Foreign Affairs group which encompassed issues of relations between New Zealand and foreign nations and our involvement in the UN. This was a group that, although vastly differed in their political views, we all gradually came to a consensus and were able to formulate a series of policies which were added to the final declaration with very little change being made in the final stages. Ultimately a strong bond was formed between me and my fellow 13 members of this group and this bond was one the most defining aspects of my Youth Declaration Journey. Through Youth Declaration I was able to witness a sampling of true politics at the government level. It was a monumental opportunity to gain experience in parliamentary politics and engage with fellow avid debaters and aspiring politicians.” **Aidan Murdoch**

## **Disc Golf**

The result of this consultation is that a committee will be formed to progress this project and assist Disc Golf South in the creation of a Disc Golf course.

## **Ministry of Youth Development funding**

In May 2016 the ICYC were selected to be recipients of a grant of \$5000 to pursue a project that encouraged Youth Council members to engage in leadership, volunteering and mentoring opportunities. A committee group of existing members has recently been created to further develop this project for completion in 2017.

## **IYCC Members' Evaluation of the 2016 Year**

Of the 30 remaining members 26 completed an evaluation form. The evaluation collected a mixture of quantitative and qualitative data about members' experience of the 2016 ICYC. The results of the evaluation showed that ICYC members rated their experience highly, with 70% of members surveyed rating their experience as 9 and above out of 10, with 7% rating their experience at the lowest rating of 7 out of 10. ICYC members felt they had an opportunity to express their opinions with 96% feeling they were listened to at Youth Council meetings. Furthermore, 88% of members' surveyed believed that the Invercargill City Council listened to the IYCC. Participation was improved on from previous years with 88% of surveyed members participating in a project team or on a committee. Comments about the mixing of the two groups (unders and overs) were mixed with some saying it was a great idea and others finding it cumbersome and fragmented. ICYC members said that they gained a whole lot of skills from attending ICYC including, public speaking, leadership, understanding local government, and gaining confidence.

## **Looking Forward**

The 2016 ICYC amended their Terms of Reference on the lessons they learnt over the year and unanimously decided to set a limit of 25 members for the 2017 intake. There is the usual natural attrition of some members leaving to pursue further education and employment goals outside the region. There is still however a group of young people keen to remain on the Youth Council for 2017. Though it will be a smaller group it is promising to see that there remains a keen interest from members to return. This has undoubtedly been a strength of the ICYC over the past few years with ability to continue projects and themes from previous years. The 2017 ICYC is set to be busy again, especially with the Ministry of Youth Development grant and continuation of projects such as the entrance signage.

## **Unders' Chairpersons Comments**

I have thoroughly enjoyed being a member of the Youth Council this year. Being a member has given me the chance to learn from the older members in order to develop and acquire new skills which I have been able to use at school and in my other extra-curricular activities. From the older members some of the things I have learnt are how to communicate ideas effectively, work as a team, encourage other members and build on my leadership skills. From being a chairperson of the 'unders' I have become more confident in sharing my opinion and encouraging others to have their say. I think that as a Youth Council we have been very successful this year. From Smoke Free Esk Street to the Youth Week Awards we have been able to fully involve ourselves in making the Invercargill area a better place for youth. Being a member last year I have been able to see the way that the splitting of the Youth Council had a positive impact on the amount of ideas that were being shared. For the 'unders' group in particular, being in a smaller group allowed everyone to feel more confident in contributing to discussions and therefore there was a greater variety and of ideas that we were able to bring forward when we meet as a full Youth Council.
