Purpose and Summary

Background

The General Policies Reserve Management Plan 2023 (GPRMP) sets objectives and policies common to all reserves administered by Invercargill City Council. This is to enable a consistent approach to management decisions and compliance with Reserves Act requirements. The General Policies for Reserves creates a more efficient management plan structure for future reviews combining all general policies into one overarching plan. It also removes the need for generic policies to be replicated across other management plans. This aims to condense Management Plan detail and ensure all reserves are included in this Management Plan, removing the need to make continuous amendments, developments and reviews.

The GPRMP is the foundation management plan from which other specific management plans are built. It delivers a level of consistency across all parks and reserves for permissible activities. Objectives, policies and other details outlined in specific management plans supersede the objectives, policies and details within the GPRMP.

As this GPRMP is a combination of existing objectives, policies and detail, it maintains the phrases and terminology relevant to the original plans.

Invercargill City Council administers a diverse portfolio of parks and reserves. The Reserves Act 1977 provides for the preservation and management of parks and reserves for the enjoyment of the public.

The Act requires the development of reserve management plans to establish the desired mix of use, and protection for reserves, and to provide the community with certainty about the function and management of each reserve.

Summary of Submissions

Eleven submissions were received.

The main points to note include:

- ICC to manage Argyle Park under its current Management Plan, which would be complemented through the general policies. Wording error in first sentence of 7.9.2 Filming Policy page 50 should say lawful, not unlawful.
- Make sure any plans involving green spaces also involve trees.
- Stead St Wharf include a café and outdoor hotpool.
- Section 6.15 Track and Path Development request to include a proviso to approach Herenga ā Nuku for their comments on any issues that relate to their areas of expertise.
- Requests more planting out around the floodbanks and connections to reserves i.e. Thomsons Bush, e.g. more flaxes and native plants (in the middle areas), especially to improve the water quality and birdlife and ensuring the land, the waters, the ecosystem and lifeforce of the Waihopai.
- Bluff need more toilets with possible shower in the main street and stop planting trees everywhere need open space for picnicking, playgrounds and community gardens. Sell underutilised land.
- Amend typo to refer to Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga or HNZPT. Sections have been noted in submission. Ensuring Heritage NZ is consulted with when planning.
- The overarching objective of the GP RMP needs to be people focused. Support key focus areas: active transport, universal design, park furniture, alignment with spaces and places and sports fields strategies, play, crime and activation and climate change.
- Policy 7.11 note mention of drones.
- Applying stronger language around accessibility to the following policies: 6.4.10, 6.4.11, 11.2.1, 6.12.1, 6.12.3, 6.12.4. Ensuring disabled groups are consulted with as well as access, universal design expert when planning.

The consultation should have highlighted the removal of management plans in the consultation materials and should have provided appropriate links for the public to compare the relevant changes. If camping is to be prohibited, camping grounds are sold off and the reserve status is revoked, then there is a potential that the new owners of the ground can use it for housing and this will reduce camping opportunities for visitors. This contradicts the intent of the current management plan. Prefers to manage Argyle Park under its current management plan, which would be complemented through general policies. Indicates wording error in the first sentence of 7.92 pg 50. It should say lawful not unlawful.	
2	Bruce Calvert			No	Yes	Recommends developing a café and outdoor hot pool area along Stead St warf site similar to ocean spa in Napier. This will be an affordable relaxing space for families and can have events like birthday parties.	
3	Guy	Red Path		Yes	Yes	Recommends including native trees in any plans that involve green spaces. Strongly advocates for the need for more trees in Invercargill. Invercargill is getting uglier, and trees are a big part of beatification and cannot afford to lose any more trees. The submission compares the changes to the riverbank waiking track before the removal of trees with the current situation and states that the walk was much more pleasant before tree removal.

Request the council to consult with the commission on decision-making on the council's parks and reserves when there is any connectivity or access issue. Recommends amending Section 6.15 to add a provision to consult the commission for advice on issues that are related to the commission's expertise. A similar amendment is recommended to the current activity management plan to add a provision to consult the commission if it is not already there.	
5	Christine Bruce			Yes	Yes	Recommends including Waihopai River as a reserve in the plan. States the recreational opportunities within Thompson Bush and the significance of Waihopai River and suggests effective planning can enhance amenities, that is by planning more native flora to improve water quality and the overall quality of its ecosystem. Recommends planning more trees on the industrial side of the waikway to hide the unappealing industrial area and to help the extremely poor drainage. Recommends prioritizing the exposed waikway alongside the river at Thompson Park and not the other side of Queens Park Drive. Suggests replanting flaxes rather than pulling them out and spraying.	
6	Alison Patrick			No	Yes	Ask to stop planting trees everywhere as it is taking away spaces that could be utilised for other activities and projects. Recommends selling land that is not being utilised. Requests for more toilets with showers at Bluff by the public information klosk or by Onslow Street near the playground or by the playground at Gore Street. Raise the issue that the one public toilet at Bluff is consistently out of service, this is an inconvenience for walking traveliers. Recommend updating the playground at Gore Street.

HNZPT invites ICC staff to consult with HNZPT staff to better protect historic heritage through reserve management plans. HNZPT has been incorrectly referred to as the 'Trust and Heritage New Zealand Properties or Heritage NZ' in the draft Plan (pages 10, 19, 42, 56, 80 and 81). Amendments are recommended to these sections to use the correct references to HNZPT. The submissions emphasise ensuring that new buildings are in line with the heritage values and character of the reserve and also emphasise the importance of considering archaeological sites when planning landscaping and the protection and maintenance of heritage sites in reserves. Several amendments are recommended to sections of the draft management plan. For ease of making changes, they provided the section number and the page number where the recommended amendments need to be made.	

8	Kieran Wall	Active Southland		Yes	Yes, contact Kieran Wall, Jess Domigan or Vanessa Hughey-Pol	Strongly believes that the objective of the plan must be people-focused to ensure that all communities have access to green space, play, recreation and sports. Recommended adding specific mention of active transport and connectivity to encourage more people to be more active. Recommends implementing Universal design principle for inclusivity given the higher rate of disability and ageing population. Recommends prioritising proactive renewal, maintenance, and capital expenditure on park amenities. Addressed that alignment is required between the draft GP RMP and Southiand Sports Fields and Spaces & Places strategies. It is important to bear in mind that the emphasis on 'places on play' covers a broader intergenerational demography. Recommends exploring opportunities for implementing OFTED principles on activating spaces to prevent crime and vandalism. Prefers seeing climate change mitigation aspects on the draft, especially on asset resilience planning.	
9	Amanda Nally	Write answers		Yes	Yes	Points out that Section 7.9.2 is factually incorrect and provides the correct legal interpretation and provides current legal interpretation. Recommends amending section 7.11 to replace the reference of UAVs to drones. This is recommended for ease of reading and to help drone operators quickly search for the key sections to follow. Suggests the need for concessions in commercial photography in public parks. Such concessions should only be required when the photographer needs exclusive use of a public area or when access to the park is restricted for other users during filming.	
10	Mary O'Brien	CCS disability action		Yes		Strongly advocates for equitable public access. Recommend consulting with disabled individuals to determine which parks and reserves they use and why, and which ones they do not use and why not, especially considering access barriers. Recommend consulting with universal design experts to mitigate access barriers through expert design advice at all stages of the project. Emphasizes the importance of small actions like providing smooth paths, seats with arms and backrests, and inclusive play elements that can mitigate access barriers. States considering accessibility issues at the early stage of the project can improve accessibility for little additional cost. Supports the use of PARCS tool. Recommends investing in high-quality safety surfacing in playgrounds and recommends the inclusion of some accessible play elements. The other specific points raised to consider forecasting future use and demand and investigatte factors that might deter people from using parks.

Section 7.9.2 is factually incorrect. Currently it reads: It is generally unlawful to take photographs of or film people in public places without their consent. However, you must not film or take photos of people if they are in a place where they can expect privacy (such as a public changing area or toilet) and that person: • is naked, in underclothes, showering, toileting etc. • is unaware of being filmed or photographed • has not given consent to be filmed or photographed This is not true, in fact under NZ Law it is the opposite. It is generally lawful to take photographs of people in public places, such as parks, reserves and without the specific knowledge or consent of the subject. It is not lawful to take photos of people in private areas like toilets and changing rooms, without their knowledge and consent. The rights to such photos taken of people in public places are owned by the photographer. Section 7.11 which deals with model aircraft and unmanned aerial vehicles (UAV) - should, in the interests of plain English, should be amended to make mention of drones. This is a large document, and it would be reasonable for people to "search" key words without reading in its entirety, as it stands a drone operator would probably miss this section altogether.

Q4. Is there anything else you would like to tell us?

In terms of commercial photography requiring concessions to photograph or film in public parks. This should apply only where the photographer requires exclusive use of an otherwise public area, or, if during the course of their filming access will be blocked or restricted to other park users. Invercargill district residents and business owners pay rates for the upkeep of city parks and reserves, and, if they wish to showcase these parks and reserves in their wedding, family photos or promotional material they should not be facing additional fee for doing so, particularly when social media influencers, for example, who are, in all likelihood not local, can readily and freely access and photograph our parks at any time.

Invercargill can't afford to get uglier and trees are a huge part of that. Invercargill is looking more and more like a face without eyebrows. Yes Invercargill has high winds, but that's not an excuse to create such a barron hellscape where we only see powerlines and streetlights lining our streets. The more tree density invercargill has, the stronger they all stand. It's worth noting that before invercargill was here it was all Forrest. Introduction We strongly support the intention of the plan as stated in section 5.2.5 Enhance and encourage equitable and safe public access into and through all public areas, however, this goal is significantly under mined by other sections of the plan e.g., Section 6.2 Buildings and Structures whilst stating that Providing access for people with disabilities is an important consideration when... .The plan then continues to provide a number of reasons for the Council to avoid or by pass the provision of accessible parks and reserves. We do not believe that this is the intention of the plan and acknowledge that it is not possible to provide fully accessible parks and reserves. Therefore, our submission focuses on some general recommendations which would strengthen the Council commitment to accessible reserves and fit with the Disability Policy that the Council is currently developing. General recommendations Disabled people will have preferred parks and reserves that they enjoy and benefit from and will also desire to use other parks and reserves which are inaccessible. When conducting upgrades or improvements we recommend 1. That the Council consult with disabled people to ascertain: - -Which parks and reserves (or part of) disabled people use and why. • Which parks and reserves or part of) disabled people do not use and why not. o We note that the plan identifies that access barriers include reaching or travelling to parks and reserves. This is important as many people with out access to cars may not be able to use public transport or it may not be available. 2. That the Council then consults with an access/universal design expert: - o To provide advice regarding the mitigation of access barriers identified that will result in as many people as possible being able to use specific parks and reserves. o To provide expert universal design advice regarding concept drawings/plan's etc during all stages of projects. o It is important to note that many barriers to parks and reserves can be mitigated by relatively small actions, e.g., providing wide smooth paths, some seats with arm and back rests, choosing play elements that can be enjoyed by all e.g., a basked swing. Following Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CEPTED) also contributes to the accessibility and useability of Parks and Reserves. Some specific recommendations 6.4.10 The development (i.e., buildings, associated facilities and landscaping) will be designed or upgraded, where practical and feasible, to meet the current national standard and design criteria for access for people with disabilities (i.e., consider Disability Strategy). Existing national standards and design criteria do not meet current best practice universal design. Whilst most Councils adhere to the minimum requirements, identifying access issues at the beginning a project can improve accessibility for little additional cost. For example, improved technology has resulted in the development of more sophisticated power chairs which require longer vans for transport. This means that many existing car parks are too short to accommodate modern mobility vans. Identifying areas in parks or reserve carparks where some longer mobility parks could be installed. This would increase the use of a park or reserve with little additional expense which may be as little as painting longer lines to accommodate a longer park. 6.4.11 Use of the PARCS tool and universal design principles where applicable may also be applied to improve accessibility and usability of reserves and their amenities. • We support the use of the Parks for Activity and Recreation in the Community (PARCS) tool. 11.2.1 Parks and Recreation Staff will work in collaboration with Roading staff (with delegated authority) and interest groups (i.e., disability groups) when looking at opportunities for access to and through reserves. • We are pleased to see that access to and through reserves is identified. Many people are unable to visit parks and reserves due to the lack of public transport, inaccessible footpaths etc. 6.12.1 Play equipment shall be maintained and upgraded as required as per the Invercargill City Council Play Strategy (when developed) to provide quality play equipment, safety surfacing and high play value. • We are pleased to see that safety surfacing is included in this section. Poor playground surfacing creates a significant barrier to disabled people of all ages accessing and benefiting from parks and reserves. Investing in high quality safety surfacing is an investment in the wellbeing of Invercargill residents. Wood/bark chip surfaces exclude many people from using parks and reserves. They are unstable and create slip, trip, fall hazards and many people cannot walk/wheel across them. We have also received reports of hazardous waste being deposited in bark chips in playgrounds. Additionally, whilst wood/bark chip surfaces may be cheaper to install we have feedback that the ongoing maintenance means that that

they are no longer a more economical option. 6.12.3 Before developing new playgrounds the following should be taken into account: Overall, we support the criteria in this section, but recommend the following amendments I. accessibility – including the inclusion of some accessible play elements 6.12.4 All new or upgraded play equipment and safety surfaces shall be designed, constructed, installed, and maintained to comply with the relevant New Zealand Safety Standards. Out comments above re standards apply to this section. It has been our experience that some playground equipment is portrayed as being accessible when in fact it is not. Our previous recommendations re expert and community consultation also apply to this section. Some comments re specific sections of this section are below. b. the level of demand and use in the area (current and forecasted future demand) Consider weather or not low levels of demand are the result of poor access and consider ascertaining why people do not use a park or reserve. c. the proximity and nature (including accessibility) of toilets provided by others in the area (e.g., schools, service stations, libraries etc.). e. Accessibility and universal design. We are pleased to see this included and recommend that as all people benefit from universal design that e. should be promoted to nearer the top of the list.

General feedback: We are really encouraged by the clarity of strategic direction and the development of the GP RMP, we feel this provides great guidance for the community and ICC for how most parks and reserves across the city can be equitably and sustainably accessed and utilised. We value the opportunity given to us to feed back into the process through its development and would like to see this collaboration continued. Objective: We strongly believe that the overarching objective of the GP RMP needs to be people focused. Its vitally important to ensure that all members of the community have access to green spaces, play, recreation, and sport. This means there is a requirement for specific focus on cultural, gender and disability inclusion. Core Focus areas: 1. Active Transport: We are encouraged to see specific mention of Active Transport and connectivity. We feel this is a critical opportunity to enable modal shift and encourage more people to be more active more often. 2. Universal Design: principles need to be implemented. Given Southland's higher rate of disability (27%) and aging population statistics (23% ICC future assumptions). It's critical that Invercargill is an inclusive city that is fit for purpose. It is UD needs to be understood as a crucial outcome for all projects. 3. Park Furniture: Through our desire to see healthy, activated reserves and green spaces we believe that further focus needs to be placed on the proactive renewal, maintenance, and capital expenditure to ensure that there is adequate provision of: pathways, shelter, natural shelter, shade, seating, access to water and toilets. 4. Existing Strategies: It's important that the GP RMP has strong alignment to both the Southland Sports Fields and Spaces & amp; Places strategies. 5. Play: We are excited to see greater emphasis places on play, however it's imperative that there is a broader understanding of play concepts. It's important to understand that all generations play, and the value of intergenerational play. 6. Crime and Activation: ensuring that opportunities to implement CPTED principles are utilised with a focus on activating spaces to prevent crime and vandalism. 7. Climate change: there is already significant periods of flooding on some reserves during winter and harsh conditions in summer. We would like to see specific work done to compliment the GP RMP to ensure that asset resilience planning or development is actioned.

Q3. What comments would you like to make on the draft Management Plan?

I do not agree with the Argyle Park Management Plan being superseded by the general policies reserve management plan. Currently the Argyle Park management plan lists Argyle park as a Major park (hence its own separate MP), to water this down into a General reserves plan limits protections under its own management plan, and once again appears to show ICC treating the Bluff community as the poor cousins. There should have been specific highlighting the consultation material to highlight the removal of the existing MP and links provided so that the public (moreso of Bluff) could compare relevant changes. At present the Argyle Park MP stipulates that one of the objectives is to allow for the provision and operation of a camp ground, removing its own MP while it may favour Council wishing to sell off the Camping Ground, detracts from the original intent of the reserve. As the General Policies plan states, camping is prohibited in reserves, Argyle park is Bluffs only camp ground, if this were to be sold off and reserve status on the land revoked, then any potential owner could scuttle the camping ground in favour of developing a home in close proximity to the ocean and then limit any opportunity for out of town campers in Bluff due to all other reserve land being off limits for camping. My preference would be for ICC to manage Argyle park under its current Management Plan, which would be complimented through the general policies.

I am the Regional Field Advisor for Herenga ā Nuku, formerly known as the Outdoor Access Commission, covering Queenstown Lakes and Southland, encompassing Invercargill. The focus of Herenga ā Nuku is access and connection. As the Crown agency charged with leadership on public access, we are a significant stakeholder in assessing recreational opportunities in urban, suburban and outdoor environments. The Commission negotiates, establishes and improves access for New Zealanders. This includes making people and organisations aware of where existing public access currently exists, could be improved and ensure that access endures over time. The Commission's mandate includes all forms of public access, including on foot, by bike, horse or motor vehicle and for all legitimate purposes. Many parks and reserves contain existing public access rights and interests, including but not limited to, marginal strips, esplanade reserves and strips, access strips and public access easements (PAEs). Some adjoin public conservation land (PCL), reserves or formed and unformed legal roads. From the standpoint of the Commission, we would like to have the opportunity to be consulted on decision making involved in council parks and reserves when there is any connectivity or access issues that may be uncovered. We customarily receive notification and are given the chance to assess ICC Road Stoppings and make submissions on them to the Council, taking into account present and future connectivity opportunities. Therefore, with all due respect, we ask that in Section 6.15 Track and Path Development of your draft plan you include a proviso to approach Herenga ā Nuku for their comments on any issues that relate to our areas of expertise.
